Course Description:

The Healer's Art is a curriculum designed by Rachel Naomi Remen, MD, Director of the Institute for the Study of Health and Illness at Commonweal, and Professor of Family and Community Medicine at UCSF School of Medicine, to address "the hidden crisis in medicine, the growing loss of meaning and commitment experienced by physicians nationwide under the stress of today's health-care system." She has taught this to practicing physicians in workshops across the country and developed a course for medical students that has been adopted by medical schools throughout the U.S., including UVa. In this one-day program, the UVa faculty who teach the course will focus on the following themes: 1. Discovering and Nurturing Your Wholeness, 2. Sharing Grief and Honoring Loss, 3. Beyond Analysis: Allowing Awe in Medicine, 4. The Care of the Soul: Service as a Way of Life. **This year's course includes new material with a greater emphasis on Grief, Loss, and Healing.**
